FROM THE DESK OF THE RECTOR

Every Sunday, after we hear the Old Testament but before we listen to the New Testament, we stand and recite a Psalm, responsively (that is, alternating between reader and congregation) by whole verse. Why do we emphasize the Psalms in our worship? What is so important about the Psalms?

We find our most true vision of ourselves in God, who reveals Himself in Scripture. God uses Scripture to show us the truth about our rational and emotional dimensions. In some parts of Scripture, God uses history to address our intellectual capacity to understand His involvement with us in the past (and, by extension, the present); in other parts, He uses poetry to address our emotional need to connect with Him.

The Psalms are poetic expressions of the mutual yearning between God and humanity; they are a collection of love-letters between God and us. As with all love-letters, they are sometimes joyful, sometimes angry, but are always emotionally honest. Over the past three thousand years, Jews and Christians have used the Psalms as a way to keep our lines of emotional communication with God clear, sincere, and true, which is the only way we can learn the truth about God and ourselves. When we read, say, or sing the Psalms, we connect with their emotional power to develop a vocabulary of praising and complaining to God in a way that rings true both to our experience and to the three-thousand-year-old experience of those who craved a poetic connection with God.

Over the past millennia, the Psalms have been invaluable aids to individuals and to communities that want to discover and articulate their deepest desires to God, who is the source and destiny of our longings. Pious tradition attributes the composition of most of the Psalms to King David as a part of his ministry to the court of King Saul. His sorrowful and joyful experiences of God's always-surprising presence and intervention produced a book of poetry that rings true with all who yearn to connect with God. Over time, the Psalms became the Hebrew hymnal. Every Sabbath, as the Hebrews gathered to hear God's word, they would combine their intellectual understanding of God with their emotional yearning for Him, using the Psalms in the same way we sing hymns. Therefore, the first reason we use the Psalms in our worship is because it is a way we connect with our historic connection with the Hebrews' religious experience as described by King David.

The second reason is more personal. As we read the Psalms, we are struck by the authentic and even visceral emotion they convey; from them we learn that God is equally accepting of our prayers of complaint as of our prayers of praise. Both Psalms and Hymns carry emotional power because they give us beautiful words that help us express our deepest feelings about God. Some of our hymns are explicitly based on specific Psalms. We think of the sad 5th stanza of Hymn 289 ("O God our help in ages past"), which is based on Psalm 90:

Time like an ever-rolling stream Bears all its sons away They die forgotten as a dream Dies as the opening day.

This sad and majestic hymn is rooted in Psalm 90's meditation on our total dependence upon God.

Or, we think of the joyful and even triumphant 1st stanza of Hymn 288, which was based on Psalm 104:

O worship the King, all glorious above!

O gratefully sing his power and his love!

Our shield and defender, the Ancient of Days,

Pavilioned in splendor and girded with praise.

This hymn's praise of God is rooted in Psalm 104's meditation on how God supplies all that His creation requires for its sustenance and strength.

Or we think of the comforting 4th stanza of Hymn 345 ("The King of Love My Shepherd Is"), which is based on Psalm 23:

In death's dark vale I fear no ill With thee, dear Lord, beside me; Th rod and staff my comfort still, Thy cross before to guide me.

This hymn's pastoral power comes from Psalm 23's meditation on God offering Himself as our Good Shepherd through all our tribulations.

Psalms, like hymns, address the full range of human emotions. Whether they are sad, angry, joyful, or desiring comfort, they encourage us to be honest with God in our prayers. They allow us to be fully human by being fully honest with God, who loves us for who we are, no matter how we are feeling. If we are to truly learn that depth and power of God's love, we must learn to speak the truth of our feelings to Him, and to allow Him to embrace and redeem the depth and truth of these feelings.


