

The Reys of St. Peter

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FROM THE DESK OF THE RECTOR

"...and whoever gives even a cup of cold water to one of these little ones in the name of a disciple-truly I tell you, none of these will lose their reward (Matthew 14:42)."

It is no simple thing to give a cup of water. In Maury County, before we turn on the faucet, fill a cup, and share it, innumerable invisible things have already taken place. Large pumps at the Columbia Power and Water treatment facility have pushed the water through pipelines large and small that ribbon beneath our streets. Before that, the facility collected that water from the mighty Duck River and screened, strained, coagulated, flocculated, and disinfected it before holding it in massive tanks for our use. Before that, the 284-mile Duck River channeled the water through a gravity-driven, free-flowing, winding path that drains and rises from the Middle Tennessee "Barrens" and drifts through Manchester, Normandy, and Shelbyville before it passes to us. Before that, the water fell from clouds of collected, cooled, and condensed vapor evaporated from the Earth's surface by the Sun. A cup of water is more than just water: it is a fusion of sun, sky, land, river, and human labor and ingenuity. But even then, that cup still requires an act of love and mercy to deliver it to those who thirst.

In the same way, an act of love and mercy is no simple thing; before we share it, innumerable invisible things have already taken place. God forms and fuels human hearts to pump and push His love through a living pipeline of relationships; in these relationships with one another, the love of God screens, strains, distills, and fills us until we overflow with action. Like a river running over hundreds of miles, this network of relationships in which we learn to love is the product of hundreds and even thousands of years of divine and human interaction. Take St. Peter's. The church we call home exists because in Columbia on April 13, 1828, George and Mary Ann Skipwith presented their infant daughter Jane Carey to the Episcopal Deacon John Davis to be baptized with water and the Holy Spirit among a group of friends: two months later, those friends organized the community of St. Peter's. Before that, in 1827, the small population of Episcopalians in Middle Tennessee was loved, served, and organized by the Rev. James Hervey Otey-later Rector of St. Peter's and first Bishop of Tennessee. Before that, in 1823, John Stark Ravenscroft, the man who ordained Fr. Otey and sent him on his missionary journey, was consecrated as Bishop of North Carolina by the General Convention of the Episcopal Church. Before that, in 1789, the General Convention of the Episcopal Church was formed by American patriots who loved our Lord, had been member of the Church of England, and wanted to continue to serve and

worship our Lord as Americans in the Anglican style. Before that, in 595 A.D., the Church of England from which we came was enveloped into the One, Holy, Catholic, and Apostolic Church by St. Augustine of Canterbury, sent by Pope Gregory the Great from Rome. Before that, in 40 A.D., a Jewish fisherman named Peter left his home in Palestine and came to Rome to support, lead, love, and give his life for Christ's "little ones" there. Before that, in about 30 A.D., Peter was called by Jesus of Nazareth to leave his nets and to become a fisher of men for the Kingdom of God. This same Peter was present when, as we heard today, Jesus told His apostles, "Whoever welcomes you welcomes me, and whoever welcomes me welcomes the one who sent me....and whoever gives even a cup of cold water to one of these little ones in the name of a disciple-truly I tell you, none of these will lose their reward (Matthew 10:40, 42)." A cup of water we share today with even the least of us in the name of Christ and His generations of disciples is more than just water; it is a local spring of mercy bursting from a river of divine love that 2,000 years ago poured from the Christ's pierced side on the Cross on which He died to save us. Even before then—even before He was born, died, and rose again for us 2,000 years ago-His originating headwater was as the only-begotten Son of God eternally flowing from God the Father from before the beginning of time. All of that love and life comes to us as a gift. It all comes from God and one day we all will return it all to God like a grateful river to the generous sea.

The Rev. John R. Claypool was one of the greatest preachers in America in the past half-century. After being ordained as a Baptist minister in 1953, he was ordained a priest in the Episcopal Church in 1986. For fourteen years he served as the Rector of St. Luke's Episcopal Church in Birmingham, Alabama, where he became a beloved friend and mentor to numerous clergy across the Southeast. One Saturday in June of 1968, John's eight-year-old daughter Laura Lue had just celebrated the end of the second grade with two recitals: a Suzuki violin performance in the morning and a ballet recital that evening. Unsurprisingly, at the end of the day she complained that she felt tired. After a few days, when the fatigue did not go away, John and his wife took her to a pediatrician who recommended a visit to the Children's Hospital where on the third day they heard an unexpected and devastating diagnosis: acute leukemia. At first, her young body responded well to the treatments and she went into remission, but before long her symptoms returned and she returned for more treatments. Finally, on a snowy Saturday eighteen months after her initial diagnosis, as John writes, "she breathed her

last and set out on a journey on which I could not accompany her." John, his family, and their entire community were devastated. One night, unable to sleep for grief, John rose from bed went to his study. Not knowing what he was doing, he pulled out a book from his shelf which turned out to be a commentary on the Book of Genesis. Apparently aimlessly, he opened the book and flipped through the pages until he found himself in a commentary on the twenty-second chapter of Genesis in which God asks Abraham to give up his son. At that moment, while reading, John had an epiphany. He realized that the main point of the story is not about Abraham's loyal, sacrificial obedience to God: the main point is Abraham's grateful trust in the goodness of God no matter what, come what may. Later, John wrote: "As I sat there in the middle of the night listening to those images out of the book of Genesis, it dawned on me that my daughter was a gift and not a possession; [...] I had the sense that I could take the road of gratitude rather than the road of resentment out of the valley of the shadow of grief."² He concluded, "I began to realize that my choice was mine to make: either living my life with my fist in God's face or being grateful she had ever been given at all."³

Everything comes from God as a gift. In this mortal life, nothing is truly ours; none of it is our private possession to cling onto. Everything flows from His hands through our hands to be passed to other hands. Our families, our passions, our blessings, and our lives are all His. Even this church family into which we have been carried is no more our own than the water He sends us to share like a bottomless cup of mercy. The God Who is good enough to shower us with gifts, blessings, and relationships of love in this world is the same God to Whom we entrust those gifts when they must pass from our hands. And He is also the God who, in the world to come in His abundant goodness, promises to perfect His gifts, to reunite us with our loves, and to resurrect us to new and eternal life. When we trust in His goodness, when we trust in His love, when we trust that we are wholly His, we can simply give Him all that we are and all that we have and then give Him thanks.
