In 1854 Henry David Thoreau wrote his great work entitled *Walden*; *or*, *Life in the Woods*. The memoir was the fruit of his decision to seclude himself in nature for two years, two months, and two days. Thoreau's vacation from the ways of the world gave him a chance to reflect on the dissatisfaction that he felt in daily city life. He concluded, famously, that "the mass of men lead lives of quiet desperation." We see this desperation today—sometimes expressed quietly and other times expressed violently. I believe that a large part of the desperation felt by the mass of men comes from the absence of hope.

The Church does not spend enough time talking about hope. Hope is the expectation of future good. No matter what befalls us—a career setback, a broken relationship, a medical problem, social injustice, civic unrest—when we enjoy the gift of hope, we are firmly entrenched in the expectation that a far greater good will come to us, not in spite of but as a consequence of our current difficulty. Hope is usually confused with faith, which is also necessary but is different from hope. Faith bravely takes action by trusting in God. Hope abides even when no action can be taken. Sometimes we face challenges that present no opportunity for action; sometimes we must simply wait and look for the good thing that God will eventually deliver. This is the essence of hope. St. Paul told the Romans, "in hope we were saved. Now hope that is seen is not hope. For who hopes for what is seen? But if we hope for what we do not see, we wait for it with patience (Romans 8.24-25)." Those who see nothing good and cannot imagine any future good have no hope; as a result, they either explode in fury or surrender to despair. Those who have hope may also see nothing good at the moment, but because they choose to hope that something even greater than they can imagine is coming, they find joy.

Even Jesus needed hope in the face of disappointment. We may be surprised to realize that Jesus was ever disappointed, perhaps because we think of him as some sort of 1<sup>st</sup> century Superman who never got hungry, thirsty, or sick; who never felt cranky or irritable; and who certainly never felt frustrated or disappointed. The reality is that Jesus is both perfectly divine and fully human: all that we experience, He experienced. He knew disappointment. The earliest record of Jesus' disappointment occurred at the beginning of His ministry, when He visited His hometown of Nazareth. While there, He was shocked to discover that the people there had so little faith in Him or in His Mission that He could not perform any miracles among them. St. Mark writes, "He was amazed at their unbelief (Mark 6.6)." The word "amazed," in Greek thaumazo, is important: while it is used many times to describe how people react to Iesus, it is used only twice in the entire New Testament to describe how Jesus reacted to people. To be amazed is to be astonished, to wonder, or to marvel. Jesus started His ministry with astonished disappointment in His hometown. After Jesus left Nazareth, He was consistently and deeply troubled by the continual faithlessness His own people showed in Him and in the Father who sent Him. Nevertheless, Jesus did not despair; He was disappointed, but He still hoped. The Hebrews' faithlessness was an obstacle that He could not remove; He had to wait in hope and see what God would develop. He hoped that His Heavenly Father would eventually deliver some greater good from his disappointment, though He could not see what that good would be.

The second time when Jesus was amazed took place on the coastal town of Capernaum, which was run by the corrupt Hebrew King Herod Antipas with the support of a Roman garrison. A delegation of Hebrew elders came to Jesus on behalf of a Roman Centurion who had a beloved servant who was sick to the point of death. Unlike many in the Roman army, this Centurion was a God-fearing man; he was a friend of and even a benefactor to the Hebrew community - he personally funding the construction of the synagogue in Capernaum. The Centurion, in his desperation to save his servant, asked his Hebrew friends to ask Jesus for help. Jesus agreed to come to the Centurion's house. As He came near, He was met by a second delegation bearing a message from the Centurion. They told Jesus that the Centurion did not see himself as a good man; in fact, he had declared that he was not worthy that Jesus should enter his house. Nevertheless, the Centurion still wanted Jesus to heal his servant; he trusted that Jesus had the spiritual and medical authority to heal his servant right there and then from far away. Luke says that, in response to this statement, Jesus "was amazed at him." Jesus was astonished by the Centurion's trust; He wondered where his trust came from and where it would lead.

While Jesus was amazed negatively in Nazareth, He was amazed positively in Capernaum. These two uses of the word "thaumazo"—"amazement"—serve as bookends to a long period of Jesus' frustration. When the Centurion showed his deep and meaningful faith in Christ's Lordship over all things in heaven and earth, including disease and death, Jesus suddenly saw what the fruits of His hope would be. In an outburst of joy, Jesus praised the Centurion by saying, "I tell you, not even in Israel have I found such faith (Luke 7:9)." Jesus had been amazed at the faithlessness of Israel; Jesus became amazed that God obviously was working to redeem not only Israel but also the whole world. Jesus' hope was tested by a long period of disappointment; that disappointment would be surpassed by what God the Father would do. Out of Jesus' early disappointment, God would bring a greater good. Jesus' hope would be fulfilled.

If God the Father did not spare His own Son from disappointment to encourage His human need for hope, we should not be surprised when we face disappointments and discover our need for hope. Sometimes we experience disappointments so profound and total that we are amazed, and we wonder whether any good will come from them. But beyond those moments of negative amazement stands the promise of positive amazement: God will bring something good and even greater from our disappointments. From our experiences that often feel like death, God will bring to us new chapters of life that anticipate our Resurrection. Beyond and beneath all our disappointments and hopes stands God, who moves in all times, places, and circumstances to bring us closer to Himself.

Our souls' houses are too small; without hope, we lead lives of desperation. God intends that these small houses should become mansions in His Kingdom. Through our disappointments, both big and small, God invites us to receive the gift of hope so that He will enlarge us, will make us worthy for Him to come under our roof, and through us share His gift of hope with the whole world.

#### MAURY COUNTY HISTORICAL SOCIETY GRANT

Several months ago, Rick and Diane Bolton took the time to apply for a grant with the Maury County Historical Society. #### Hello Rick,

There was more than the usual discussion about the grants at the Board meeting on Monday evening. The number of grant applications received this year was more than double the number submitted last year. The discussion revolved around six of those applications, with the Board desiring to support each project but having limited grant funds available.

St. Peter's outside restoration project is one of the six that was approved for a grant, though not in the amount that the Historical Society would like to have been able to give in support of the work.

There will be an "official" award notification coming to you, but "unofficially" let me say that support in the amount of **\$1,000** was approved for your project. Time-wise, if the project continues in the next calendar year please consider applying for a year 2021 grant to help with whatever stage of the restoration project that you are in at that time.

On a personal note, I love St. Peter's and the wealth of history that it holds and represents. Thank you to all who so diligently care for this historical gem which has at this season in time been entrusted to you.

It is designed to minister to all the brave women who will journey through breast cancer. It is Cathy's mission to get this CD into the hands of those women walking the road behind her. Cathy has served as the choir director and music minister for several churches throughout the years. She enjoys being part of the choir here at St. Peter's and has written several original pieces and arrangements for them. She also teaches piano and enjoys serving as the music director for many plays at the Maury County Arts Guild.
